monetary reserves. It is very clear that, unless we keep asking for it (squeaky wheels and all that) it won't happen.

If we rest after our years of effort, if we blink after putting in many years of experience, if we turn our heads away from our goal of a well-deserved retirement, we might lose some of our hard-earned benefits that we have laboured so hard to get.

to become what I wanted to become. You taught me how to learn for myself.


