#### I'm Retired but Still Teaching by Guillermo Bustos

No! I do not mean TOC'ing. I mean teaching for the fun of it. Shortly after my retirement, a colleague approached me to join the ElderCollege Delta team.

My first assignment was a four-session on the History of Canada. I was surprised by the number of people registering. At the beginning of the first session I asked how many had taken a Canadian History course at school. All but two raised their arm. So, I asked why did they want to learn something that they were taught at school. A lady with a very broad smiled shouted: "because at school we didn't pay attention!" The room roared with laughter.

Teaching educated adults requires a lot of preparation, as they bring along a wealth of experience and knowledge. Researching for the courses became an almost daily routine. But what could have become a chore, became a constant source of stimuli and surprises: some people, so many facts and ideas that I had not known before! Teaching has kept my brain active and my enthusiasm for learning alive.

As years have passed, people attending started making requests and I obliged. We have tackled together such topics as the Reformation, the Religious Wars, the Great Depression, the Great War, the Arab-Israeli conflict, the Middle East, Russia after the USSR and China after Mao.

ElderCollege was a local creation. Many Delta retired teachers have contributed to its progress. It was the only third level education place for seniors not linked to a university or college. Now North-Vancouver ElderCollege has become separated from Capilano College. I hope that some of you will consider joining us in this venture.

My first reactive thoughts to **freedom** in retirement--the feelings of happiness not having to be trapped in a classroom--flipped immediately to others more serious. I am free to visit dementia in the form of my 92-year-old mother three-plus times a week—both a pleasure and nurturing necessity. I am free to play late-evening chef most nights for my talented 26-year-old son, working full time, still living at home, as I support his dedication as an international athlete. I am free to attend to my sanity walking in sweet silence with my dog, or downloading the day at twilight in a myriad of swirling musings of what life is and of what life could be. But also, I have **time**, free to choose these things--appreciating that retirement has offered the blessing of special time for family.



#### 2019 BCRTA-AGM Report

#### Friday, Oct 4 – Delegates' Day

The day began with a very informative and humorous talk by Dr. Art Hister. He addressed an

attentive audience about maintaining good health as a life-long mission. He listed 7 things to keep in mind for personal health – **Don't smoke, Exercise regularly, Eat sensibly, Minimize stress, Maintain healthy weight, Get enough good sleep, and Drink alcohol in moderation**. In addition to that advice, Dr Art added his most important health tip is to **Sit less; Move more** and used the humorous example of how to achieve it – to live in a 2-storey house and have a poor memory.





Following a brief stretching set of exercises, the next session was presented by the women who wrote the book on "Showing Clutter the Door". Each spoke about the different times and ways we can begin to eliminate the detritus that has accumulated in our homes — the basic what, when, and how to declutter.

BCRTA's Executive Director, Tim Anderson, spoke about the administrative goals for the up-coming year including upgrading computer software and expanding its coverage for local Branches and building strong partnerships that benefit members. Tim also led the delegates through the results of the Member Survey found in the Summer edition of PostScript.

Much of the afternoon was spent with our regional Branches in very useful discussions stemming from the Member Survey and the issues identified. All agree that getting BCRTA information out to pre-retirees has become more difficult since the Privacy Act's passage and the ability to engage with all current members. Hopefully, we can work together and figure out something that works.



The highlight for me came that evening after dinner when the Communications Committee and the editors of the PostScript presented awards for member contributions to the magazine. I was presented with the <u>first ever</u> **Sheila Gair Award** for Best Personal Experience article (*A Rediscovered Joy*) published in the Spring 2019 edition. The PostScript Award for Best Travel Article was given to Penticton's Garry Litke for his article *Fez* 

(Spring 2019) and Delta's own, David Wei, was awarded for his photo of Haida Gwaii (Fall 2018).

#### Saturday, Oct. 5 – Annual General Meeting

The day began with the R.R. Smith Memorial Fund Foundation, the charitable arm of the BCRTA, holding their AGM. 8 Directors were acclaimed into office. Immediately following, the 2019 BCRTA AGM began with a minute of silence for members who had passed away. Then it was on to business for the up-coming year. #### **Finishing Touches**

To bring this newsletter to its conclusion, there are bits and pieces of news from the BCRTA and elsewhere that you might like to know.

- a) 2 issues brought up at the October AGM were addressed by a letter from Gerry and the Board. The first was sent to the Federal and Provincial Health Ministers, the 5 federal party leaders and the BC Premier **urging legislation banning flavoured juices in vaping devices**. The second letter was addressed to all Branch Presidents urging them **to strive to eliminate single use plastics and Styrofoam at their meetings**.
- b) A steering committee was formed to plan the BCRTA's 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary for 2020.
- c) The BCRTA has been successful in negotiating with the BC Pensions Corporation to use *Pension ID numbers* instead of *Social Insurance Numbers* to facilitate the annual deduction of BCRTA fees. Once the conversion is complete, all SINs will be removed from BCRTA files.
- d) One of the newer initiatives that the Delta RTA Executive endorses is to utilize shared resources when bringing special events to the Lower Fraser area. Surrey RTA, along with Langley and Delta, jointly hosted Gerry Tiede's "Pensions and Insurance" workshop this week. Although participation from Delta members was sparse, the effort marks, what we hope will be, more opportunities available for members to get out and learn.
- e) In conjunction with the Delta Seniors Planning Team, the DRTA will co-host a free workshop Stay on the Road May 28<sup>th</sup>, 2020 at the Cedar Park Church in Ladner. More information about its target audience (you) and purpose (safe driving as you age) will be included in the next issue of TRUANT.

The business of the BCRTA continues next week with its committees and Directors meeting to discuss its work over the last 6 weeks and to further plan for the next 9 months.

The Delta Retired Teachers Association is looking for volunteers to help with Executive leadership. <u>Della Henderson</u>, our Vice-President for more than 10 years, has decided it is time to truly "retire" and won't be seeking reelection in May. I, too, am giving my notice. I will stay on as your President for the remainder of this year and, if re-elected this May, will help "train" someone new so I can retire at the end of June 2021. Please start thinking how you can volunteer to keep the DRTA a vibrant Branch of the BCRTA.
