He overcame many obstacles to live a life full of loyalty, achievement and authenticity. Monty inspired many young people as a swimming and baseball coach, and as a science teacher. He loved golfing, camping, swimming, playing cards with friends, watching the Canucks play, and skiing (in his younger, more fit, years). He was dearly loved by his wife, Betty Ann Martin and a hero to his three daughters, Diana, Jenny and Mindy. He was such a proud father and would boast about the accomplishments of his daughters, sons-in-law (Jon, Mike & Tom) and grandchildren to anyone who would listen.

He was a friend to everyone. Monty didn't do awkward silence he would talk to anyone and everyone - and so he was known and loved by more people than one may think possible. It wasn't uncommon for someone to randomly yell out "Hey Mr. Martin! You taught me science 15 years ago!" and of course, Monty would remember them and have a good catch-up.
