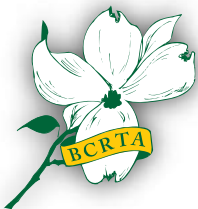

By investigating these sites you will be able to find an abundance of information about our branch! All executive members' names and contact information are listed on both sites. As Membership chair, I

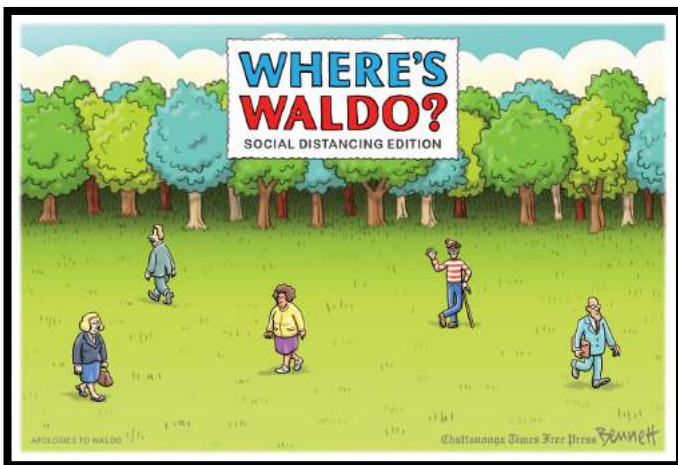
encourage both members and non-members to contact me with any membership questions or concerns at lrta.35@gmail.com.
