Volunteering (An incredible number of opportunities are available), Joining an Adult Discussion Group, Joining Neighbourhood Watch, Adopting a Street, Getting a Pet, Starting Yoga or some other Fitness Program, Joining a Walking Club, Swimming or taking Swimming Lessons, Searching for lost friends or relatives, Healing, establishing or maintaining relationships, Becoming an active Participant in your own health, Spoiling Grandchildren, Joining the Burnaby Retired Teachers' Executive or Attending church.

There is a growing concern that people, and especially seniors, will not return to previous activities because of a general malaise caused by heat, floods, fires, and viruses even if they realize that these activities extend lives and improve physical vitality. A lot of Seniors are lonely. In fact, on average, seniors without spouses or partners spend about ten hours alone each day.

BURNABY SCHOOL BOARD-SUPPORTING STUDENT PLANNING FOR NEXT FALL

Students across the District have lots of options for programs to explore their interests, and numerous electives are offered at the secondary level. AP Biology students from Burnaby Mountain Secondary are seen here presenting their inquiry projects. And AP Physics students at École Alpha Secondary are testing their projectile projects. There's something for everyone with Programs of Choice focused on technology, sports academics, trades and career training – as well as educational enrichment, such as French Immersion and AP Capstone.

To help students and families navigate the choices, several information sessions have been underway. In support of health and safety, instead of open houses at high schools to learn about course planning and more, they're sharing information online for the second year in a row. Each school is taking an approach to best meet the needs of their community, with everything from a virtual tour, to a pre-recorded video or live presentation. Hundreds of people have already attended the series of sessions put on by the **Career Education** department. Students who have taken the programs shared their firsthand experiences.

BURNABY SCHOOLS ALUMNI IN THE NEWS-Students are the leaders of tomorrow and today, and it is always exciting to hear about graduates finding success in their chosen fields. Former **Moscrop Secondary** student **Nabil Karim** gave a shout out to his old high school in a news article celebrating his new high-profile role: host and reporter for Turner Sports network's NHL and NBA coverage.

SUPPORTING SUSTAINABLE CHOICES-As we seek opportunities to reduce our carbon footprint, the District is supporting school communities to do the same. One of the ways we're doing so is by installing electric vehicle charging stations. All high schools now have at least two stations, except for Burnaby North Secondary, which will get theirs when the new building is complete. Additionally, the District's Maintenance Services Centre has two electric vehicles in its fleet and four EV stations. The new District Administration Office was designed to include four outlets. This work is a piece of larger efforts to reduce our environmental impact and contribute to sustainability.

TWO SCHOOLS EARN HEALTHY SCHOOL CERTIFICATION

This is the third year that Burnaby Mountain Secondary has earned a healthy school certification from DASH – or Dedicated Action for School Health. It's a provincial organization that recognizes schools' commitment to enhancing the health and well-being of their school communities. Mountain's Wellness Council, with its focus on mental health, is responsible for a number of the school's initiatives. This is Burnaby South Secondary's second year earning the designation. Students are seen here supporting South's health goal of having a nutritious breakfast before starting school. 400 breakfast items and recipes were distributed.

STUDENT TEAM WINS HIGH SCHOOL ETHICS BOWL

Twelve secondary teams from the lower mainland had a day-long ethics bowl hosted by **Simon Fraser University's Philosophy Department**. Students discussed real-world cases and ethical issues.

They were judged on their evidence and how well they collaborated, listened and responded to the opposing team. Congratulations to the winning team from our very own **École Moscrop Secondary**.

ROBOTICS TEAM HEADING TO PROVINCIAL CHAMPIONSHIP

Students in the District's **Robotics (Mechatronics) Career Education Program** hosted at **Alpha** competed in the **BC Regional Robotics Tournament** last weekend. With more than 100 teams contending, the students won the judge's award and are the division finalists. Their impressive performance has them advancing to the BC Provincial Championship.

THE GIFT OF GIVING

The University Highlands Elementary community is collecting food, toiletries and toys to donate to the ongoing flood relief efforts. Students at Parkcrest Elementary raised money for the Abbotsford SPCA to help them support displaced animals. Alpha collected clothing and blankets for the Salvation Army to take to flood victims. Leadership students at the school decorated a Deer Lake Rotary Tree to put warm boots on children in Burnaby this winter. Among the many schools collecting donations for the Food Bank and Burnaby families in need are Buckingham, Suncrest, and Lyndhurst, as seen here. Several, such as South Slope Elementary and BCSD, are also offering online food drive options to make a difference. Inman students put together nearly 300 dental kits for the Burnaby Homeless Task Force. They will be included, along with handmade cards, in comfort kits that will be distributed to Burnaby's most vulnerable. Lochdale Community School collected and delivered wrapped presents for distribution by The Society to End Homelessness in Burnaby. Burnaby North students created 2400 holiday cards in one week for seniors in Burnaby. They were one of more than a dozen secondary and elementary schools participating in Operation Elf – put on in partnership with Intentional Acts of Kindness and the City of Burnaby's Citizen Support Services.

CREATIVITY BY BCSD STUDENT LEADS TO OPPORTUNITIES AND BUSINESS -Kyle Cooney was featured in the North Shore News for bracelets he created that are much more than pieces of jewelry or linking beads. As the story says, the bracelets "are links connecting Kyle to the world." The young entrepreneur is in Grade 6 at the BC Provincial School for the Deaf. Kyle has CHARGE syndrome, which includes deafness, Autism, developmental delays, coordination and balance challenges. With the bracelets, he has been learning business and other skills that support his independence. So far, he's sold almost 300 for just under \$30 each and is expanding to more stores. Most of the money earned goes to Kyle's Registered Disability Savings Plan, which will help support him in adulthood. He is also donating a portion of profits to those in need. Most recently Kyle purchased items, such as diapers and baby food, for the Archway Food Bank to help flood relief in Abbotsford.

INDIGENOUS CARVING PROJECT SUPPORTS LEARNING AND COMMUNITY

The entire school community at **Taylor Park Elementary** is involved in a new project under the guidance of Indigenous artist **Simon James**, whose ancestral name is **Winadzi**. He is from the **Kwakwaka'wakw Nation**. James created the design for the carvings after several months of connecting with students, staff and families, who shared their values and stories with him. James is also working with **Squamish Nation Elder Sheryl Rivers** to honour local teachings and protocol. Beginning this month, all students from Kindergarten to Grade 7, along with staff, are getting the chance to listen to James' teachings and work on the carvings.
