

Now, for something completely different. Caroline Malm told me about Spelling Bee, a daily challenge presented in the New York Times, in which readers are given a set of seven letters, and challenged to come up with as many words as they can, using only the letters given (though each letter can be used any number of times in a given word) and all words using a mandatory letter. The given letters are organized in circular fashion, encircling one letter, that centre letter being required in each word. Just search for "New York Times Spelling Bee" and you can find it easily, though a paid subscription is required if you want to have more than just a sample of the puzzle.

However, there is a free version of the puzzle, available online at https://spellbee.org/ with a daily puzzle, and lots of puzzles archived. There are several equivalent websites you can access by using your favourite search engine (e.g. google). If you are a **Scrabble** player, this puzzle can be a good means of improving your Scrabble game. Try it. I think you'll like it!
