(Opening photo)

The opening photograph shows "The Retreat," the first saloon in Sapperton. It

was opened early in 1861 by Fred Howson and J. Hilliard for the convenience of the Royal Engineers at the camp. The Royal Engineers camp was located on the site where the B.C. Penitentiary was started in 1877, completed in 1878, and closed in 1980 after 108 years in operation. After closing, the land was sold and developed as a residential area. All that remains of the original "Pen" is the Gatehouse which became the Castle Neighbourhood Grill, the Coal House which can be found in Sapperton Landing Park, and the original Centre Block which presently houses some offices and the cemetery.

Abbotsford Airshow


This runs from August 11th -13th. The price of admission is between \$12.00 and \$215.00.

A Painted House

A John Grisham novel

Where were you in '52?? 1952 that is... The novel, The Painted House is set in the summer and early fall of 1952. Written by John Grisham, the story is inspired by his childhood and growing up in rural Arkansas. But wait....many of us will equate novels penned by Grisham to be of the legal thriller genre...The Pelican Brief, The Firm, The Rainmaker, to name a few.



The Painted House is definitely not a legal thriller. It is a suspenseful read however....a story that unfolds in the farm country of the Arkansas Delta.

It's a story about the cotton harvesting season as told through the eyes of a seven-year old boy named Luke. He lives with his parents and grandparents on a farm in the cotton fields, in a house that's never been painted. Hmm....and what might that mean in rural Arkansas in the fifties.

As life on the farm moves toward the cotton-picking season, complete with heat, rain and exhaustion, seven year old Luke sees and hears things not usually witnessed by a young lad and for which he is totally unprepared. Add in Mexican cotton pickers as well as a family from the Ozarks, and you have the makings of a story that may have you keen to keep turning the pages.....to be part of Luke's journey as the hot, tiring and sometimes adventurous weeks pass by. As you are reading, you may even ask yourself now and then, why is this book called A Painted House?


