BC Retired Teachers' Association has continued focusing on the future of the organization and the needs of its members. On-going concerns about small Branch viability, encroachment by the Ontario Retired Teachers group into BC, changes to the current insurance plans available to

teaching retirees and their families, and BCRTA Travel were all addressed by appropriate committees and the Board of Directors.

A major focus has been the up-coming Federal Election. ACER/CART had created a preliminary information booklet whose intent was to help us (the Canada-wide RTA membership and seniors generally) focus on specific senior voters' concerns. Each BCRTA committee has met at least twice in person and once using Zoom since the beginning of 2025. Considerable time has been spent to improve communications with members. The addition of a new staff person, Alina Shamina, who has considerable expertise with media, has begun to update BCRTA information on the website and expanding into a variety of social media vehicles. Her presentations to the Communications and Finance committees about her work was both enlightening and wide-ranging. Applications for Golden Star awards for active teachers have been received by the Excellence Committee. 4 classes and their teachers from all over the province have been chosen to receive the \$2000 award. The Heritage Committee has been able to consolidate many of the artifacts into one collection and continue to seek documents and artifacts from Branches around the province. They have visited both the UBC and SFU campuses to see how preserving documents and records is done. This past month, Member Well-Being Committee visited the Kerrisdale Seniors Center and Vera's Housing Co-op in Vancouver to explore alternatives/options for Ageing in the Right Place for members and other BC seniors. The Travel Committee reviewed latest trips for BCRTA members, families and friends and discussed where to explore next. During the recent BCTF

AGM, the Membership Committee set up an information booth for the delegates to learn more about the benefits of being a member of our Association. Many visitors with lots of questions. All the committees will remain active until our BCRTA AGM in September when new ideas will inspire the work done by volunteers working on your behalf.

Scammed with Suspected AI Voice Cloning

Last month, a 72-year-old grandmother was awakened by a call from police. Then, another voice came on the line.

"Hi, grandma. Yeah, I got in trouble here. The police say they need some money to release me or they're going to keep me in jail."

The senior was certain it was her grandson, John, on the phone. She was told he'd been arrested for stealing a car and that he needed \$9,000 to be sent to police for his release. Only, it wasn't her grandson. It was a scam phone call so convincing that investigators believe fraudsters used artificial intelligence to clone John's voice. John's grandma says that even though the voice sounded slightly different, it was convincing enough to agree to pay up. "I was anxious to get the money out; I'd do anything for my grandchildren," she has said. This is broadly known as the "emergency" or "grandparent" scam. And sadly, it's been a successful ploy; Canadians reported losing nearly \$3 million to this scam in 2024 alone, according to figures from the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre.

The rise of deepfakes in scamming

In the U.S., the Financial Crimes Enforcement Network sounded the alarm in a November 2024 report, warning that such "highly realistic" deepfakes "can manufacture what appear to be real events, such as a person doing or saying something they did not actually do or say."

Protect yourself: Have a code word or phrase with family and friends, so the next time the phone rings, you can test who's on the other line. Use a **simple** unique word, phrase, or question that's not easy to guess. So don't use things like pet or family names or a nickname, especially if it has been used on social media. Agree on your word and speak to them face-to-face. Ensure your trusted ones know and understand the purpose of the code and know how to pronounce it even if they may be under stress.

Experts say you should ask for the codeword as soon as possible in your communication to limit engaging with the scammers. Don't get bogged down in a conversation with them. If the caller or messenger doesn't know or repeat the word or phrase, or is not able to answer a personal question, it's almost certainly a scam and you can hang up.

Follow up: Check on the whereabouts of the genuine person being mimicked and report the crime to police.

Volunteer Teaching and the Latino workers

After a few years of retirement, and more recently becoming a widow, I have been looking for something interesting to do. In Delta we have a lot of greenhouse workers who work long hours. I discovered that some of these men want to learn English. I taught ESL for most of my life, so I decided to offer my services as a volunteer for two small day groups. They are given time off from work to attend on Wednesdays and Fridays. Soon I will also visit the Wednesday night sessions which are larger and offer three levels. Sometimes there is no-one to teach at night as a volunteer substitute. If this is a passion of yours, and you have time to spare, contact Latino Workers Support Society on Facebook. If soccer is your game, eight teams compete in the summer, and you might like to assist them. The support team provide other recreation activities for the workers throughout the year. One recent weekend they were given free curling time locally. I didn't know about these services before. I knew only that bicycles and other donations were needed. Last week the Society was able to provide a worker with a new TV set which had been donated. I am really enjoying this new activity and it brightens my week.

In Memoriam

John Cummins (March 12, 1942-March 2, 2025)

Former Delta-Richmond East Member of Parliament (1993 – 2011), former leader of the BC Conservative Party and retired Delta teacher John Cummins passed away in Kamloops Inland Hospital. He taught in the Northwest Territories and northern Alberta before coming to Delta for 15 years. Cummins taught both Grade 1 and high school math. He loved his time on the water and became a vocal proponent of the commercial fishing industry.

After retiring from politics, the Cummins family moved to Langley where they had a farm. They then lived in on the

Island in Ladysmith before moving to Kamloops to be closer to family.





Recommended Reading for Those Lazy Summer Days Ahead

The God of the Woods by Liz Moore

This book grabbed me right from the beginning. Rich people send their children to an exclusive summer camp for the summer, many so they can carry on with their lives without their teens underfoot. This is like any other camp where teenage angst and other issues play out – or is it? The daughter of the owner of the camp, Barbara, goes missing which initiates a frantic search for her. But she isn't the first child to go missing at this camp! As the search takes place, various tensions arise – the townspeople who work at the camp and the rich whose lives the townsfolk can only dream about, camp staff and their privileged charges, etc. Several stories unfold, each with its own series of events but they eventually sort themselves out in a satisfactory manner. I had a difficult time putting the book down!






The Grey Wolf by Louise Penny

This is the latest book that Canadian author, Louise Penny, has written in the Inspector Gamache of the Sûrèté de Quebec in Montreal series. Chief Inspector Gamache is chilled by some relentless phone calls followed by a series of puzzling clues that do not seem to be at all related. Something dark and dangerous is about to happen but what is it and whom will it impact? The one thing that is missing is the connection to the Three Pines community that factors so prominently in the other Chief Inspector Gamache books,but I understand that the next book, "The Black Wolf", will make up for that! This is a

psychological thriller that I, again, had difficulty putting down. Much as I tried to read it slowly to make the book last longer, I just couldn't do it. I'm planning on rereading it soon to see what I missed the first time!

Still Alice by Lisa Genova

Dementia and other related cognitive issues such as Alzheimer's are on the rise as the population ages. Most of us know someone who is living with Alzheimer's so we have seen the effect of the disease in action. In this book, the main character, Alice Howland, is diagnosed with having early onset Alzheimer's. She is a cognitive psychology professor so she understands where the disease will take her on its journey. But, she denies the inevitable, fighting hard to retain what memory she has, fighting her family to retain what control she still has over her own life. This book is unusual in that is told from the perspective of the person who has Alzheimer's and not the caregivers. It is a compelling, difficult read. I had read the book a few years ago, but with a loved one now living with Alzheimer's related dementia, I read it with a different eye this time and I was impressed with how some of her journey closely resembled



the path my loved one is on even though my loved one is much older than Alice. While there is no known cure for Alzheimer's, if you have someone who is experiencing memory loss or other symptoms of the illness, the sooner you see a doctor, the sooner you can access services that may help the family learn to assist their loved one and to find support for the caregivers. Time is of the essence.



Great Big Beautiful Life





<u>Rediscover Dominoes</u> – Simple yet intriguing games you can play with 2 or more players.



Shuffle a Deck of Cards -

A. Games of Solitaire

- Klondike the Classic single player game.
- <u>Island of Cards</u> Aim is to complete a 7 X 7 grid of cards, filling every spot with a card. At the end of the game, you would lose a point for any card not placed. Gain one point for each card left your draw deck. Each turn you will draw a card and place beside a card that has a value higher or lower by one. As the deck become thinner and the island grows, you choices will diminish.
- <u>Clock</u> To start the game, deal yourself 13 piles of four cards. Twelve of those piles go in a circular pattern that lines up with the hour markers on a clock face, and the 13th pile goes in the middle of the circle. Start the game by turning over the top card in the centre pile and put it under the hour pile that corresponds to its rank. (Aces represent one o'clock, jacks are 11 o'clock, queens are 12 o'clock, and kings go in a second pile in the centre, face up.) After you've moved the first card, turn over the top card of the stack you moved it to. Then move that card to its corresponding pile and keep going until you can't make any more moves.
- **Pyramid** The set-up for this game involves arranging 28 cards face-up in a pyramid-shaped tableau of seven levels. The rest of the cards form a draw pile. The goal of the game is to remove all the cards from the pyramid by forming pairs with a combined value of 13 points. The pairs may be formed from two exposed cards in the pyramid, or by pairing a pyramid card with another card as it is drawn from the draw pile. In this point scheme, the king is assigned a point value of 13, the queen is 12 points, the jack is 11 points, and the ace is one point. The remaining cards are scored at face value.
- Wish Get a standard deck and remove all of the twos and sixes. Deal the cards so there are eight columns with four cards each face up. If a row showing the entire cards has a pair, such as two kings on the first row, match them and remove them from the table.
 Keep matching until you match all of the cards. Keep in mind you can only match cards that are on the row where you can see the full card.

B. Play with a Partner


- Honeymoon Whist The initial face-up card of the stock determines the trump suit for the hand. You each get a hand of 13 cards, and in turns play a card to decide who wins the top card of the stock, which is always kept face-up, while the loser of a trick gets the face-down card underneath it. In that way both players each get a replacement card each trick, with the winner leading the next trick. Once the stock is depleted, you play out your hand of 13 cards, and the person who gets the most tricks from these 13 tricks wins the game.
- <u>Le Truc</u> Remove 2's through 6's from a full deck to play, because it uses a 32- card deck with a somewhat unorthodox ranking of values. Suits don't matter at all in this simple trick-taking game. You each get three cards that you'll use for only three tricks, each of which goes to the highest card played, and tied tricks going to whoever wins the next trick. Winning the hand requires winning two out of three tricks, and earns a point, and the goal is to be the first player to 12 points. But the genius is that before playing a card you can propose to increase the amount of points that the current hand is worth; your opponent can fold and concede rather than increase the stakes. To prevent too much luck, the person leading can also propose a redeal before the first card played.
- <u>Slapjack</u> The entire deck is dealt at once, with each player receiving 26 cards, which are kept face-down. Players take turns turning over one of their cards at a time, with the fastest player to slap the Jack after it appears winning all of the cards that have accumulated in the pile. The game continues until someone has collected all of the cards.
- <u>James Bond</u> The goal is to get four-of-a-kind rank matches in all your card piles. Each player will get six piles of four face-down cards each. The last four cards in the deck are placed face-up between the players. Going pile by pile, in any order but only one pile at a time, players can swap cards out with the face-up cards in the middle to create four-of-a-kind in that pile. Once all your piles are four-of-a-kind matches, you say "James Bond!" and show your cards for the win.
- <u>Trash</u> The goal is to collect cards numbered from 1 to 10. Start by laying out 2 rows of 5 cards in front of each player. Then, create a draw pile with the remaining cards. On your turn, you'll take a card from the draw pile. If the card fits in your sequence, place it in the correct position. For instance, an ace goes in the first spot at the top left. Next, flip over the card you swapped out. If you can use it in another spot, great! If not, just discard it. The first player to collect all 10 cards wins!
