Our Members Write

Retirement: What Now?

In 1990 at Simon Fraser University where I did my professional development training to become a teacher, we were tasked with making a visual representation of our life's journey thus far. I still have mine: there's me as a little fish swimming from birth to kindergarten, up through school, university and work, love and marriage. Next step: become a teacher! I drew myself as a fish wearing a mortarboard and a cape.

Now I have swum through the fish ladder of my professional life, here I am, spawned, exhausted and presumed ready for immediate decay (or perhaps about to be snapped up in the jaws of some bear or eagle). Years ago, while watching fish spawning up in Alaska, I heard tourists exclaim, "How sad! How tragic!" as they bemoaned salmon ending this way.

"It's not tragic!" I spoke none too quietly. "It is the circle of life!"

(I was a biology major, if that is not obvious.)

"We are but placeholders for those who come after us," I offer with love and lucidity.

My time here is limited, afterlife or no. Whether my atoms disperse rapidly or slowly, my current awareness will someday cease to exist. So how do I square this with the exquisite privilege that I can now sleep in pretty much any day of the week?

A part of me whispers, "What now, Susan? What now?"

What is my identity now that I am no longer working? What is my purpose? And sure, I just might want to do some occasional teaching: I like using my skills and rising to new challenges. I like the connections, fast or slow, easy or less than. I have always learned about myself as much as about the students and the adults in the building.

But is there more of that?

Last week I had a late-night phone call with my adult daughter. She seemed down. Her days off are not the same as most people and it had been a while since we were together.

"How's about I come over Friday? We can play cards and go somewhere for dinner!"

We invited my own mother to join us too. Our purpose that day: play cards with two women we adore! This was a privilege of retirement and an opportunity for connection.

I also had a lovely day of connection, art and friendship as one of my first experiences with the Delta Retired Teachers' Association. In early October, seventeen or so teachers walked or drove onto the 10:25 am sailing from Tsawwassen to Galiano Island. Once ashore, we were

met by Kit Grauer and Peter Scurr, two retired Delta art teachers, who piloted us the short walk to their *Galiano Relief Retreat* (with some confusing signage also identifying it as the *Paradise Care Home*).

We learned the basics of relief printmaking and made some of our own. We rolled ink until we heard just the right sound—a distinctive and satisfying *click*! Each of us took turns cranking the wheel of the printing press and lifting off the paper prints. We feasted on beer-basted chicken, ham, various salads and other goodies. We shared stories and we asked questions. I identified the ringing sound of the raven for my friend Marianne.

We left in the early evening, each of us clutching our own numbered print and—fittingly—the connections, memories and ideas etching our collective minds. It was a wonderful initiation into retirement.

Addressing Issues to Prevent Falling – Do It Now!


Outside of falling in love or things falling into place, falling is something we want to avoid, especially as we age. In Canada, most older adults — over 92% — live in the community, meaning they live in their own private dwelling or in a residence specifically for older adults such as a retirement community. Risks that increase the chances of experiencing a fall include having a previous history of falls, living with one or more chronic diseases, sensory issues, limited mobility, taking certain medications, engaging in unsafe behaviours like rushing, and environmental factors.

The Bottom Line

- → Globally, more than 680 thousand people die from falling every year, while millions more require medical care.
- → Environmental hazards, such as poor lighting and walking surfaces, are responsible for 30% to 50% of falls experienced by older adults. Find ways to eliminate them for you in your home.
- → Take an Environmental program so you know what fall-hazards to remove in your home to lower the potential of falling yourself or your loved one especially those older adults who are at high risk of falling.
- → Consult with your healthcare team about your risk of falls and what environmental strategies may be best for you.



BCRTA REPORT

September to November 2025

Beginning on the afternoon of September 25th, the final meeting of the 2024-25 Board of Directors met in Richmond's Hilton Hotel to begin the BCRTA's annual 3-day Conference and General Meeting. Following registration and visiting with one another, the delegates were treated

to a unique and joyous musical interlude by a troupe of Métis dancers and fiddlers. The weekend was off to a great start.

The Conference began early Friday morning with a talk from Devona Putland from a small town in Saskatchewan, whose talk on Sustaining Age Friendly Programs in your communities was insightful and encouraging for those realizing our communities can do more for all seniors living near-by. Crawford Killian spoke about Education from the Stone Age to Al. He looked back to the pedagogy that kept our ancient ancestors alive for many thousands of years, the functions of education in evolving societies, and the uncertain promise of artificial intelligence. The final speaker, Vicki Robinson, long-time BC educator and a Past-President of the Abbotsford District Teachers Association, and who committed decades to supporting people in crisis and grief, provided unique insights on what everyone should know when facing life's final chapter. She covered the "musts" of preparation, such as palliative care and hospice and addressed concerns we all have concerning MAID. All appreciated her depth of knowledge and compassion for those who are needing to deal with these issues.

Friday evening, following dinner, is always highly anticipated as attendees are informed of the winners of the annual PostScript Awards. Members of the Communications Committee had secretly voted on which magazine contributions were award-worthy. As editor of the magazine, Tim Anderson presented the videos of his conversations with the unaware article winners. The photo award went to Tom Skinner for his series of Autumn shots from the Fall 2024 issue. The Best Travel article was awarded to DRTA member, Janey Harper, for her amazing tale of bicycling in South America in the Summer 2024 magazine. The most highly prized "Sheila Gair" award went to another DRTA member, Gerald Soon, for his article "The Paper Trail" which can also be found in the Summer 2024 edition.

The BCRTA AGM began Saturday morning following the RR Smith Memorial Fund Foundation's AGM. The delegates were pleased with the positive comments following the Financial Audit conducted by MNP of Maple Ridge. The fees for 2026-27 were approved at \$59 for the year.



be and to decide what to do with it when it is unexpectedly gifted to her. The closer she gets to the painting's birthplace, the more nervous she becomes about what she'll find.


3. **The Widow** – John Grisham

John Grisham is an acclaimed master of the legal thriller. Now, he's written his first-ever whodunit.



A woman navigating the complex power dynamics among her fellow Susans, whose greatest fears and desires lie just behind the gossip they exchange.

Told over a single day, with razor-sharp precision and wit, *Pick a Colour* confirms this Canadian author's place as a premier chronicler of the immigrant experience, in its myriad, complex, and slyly subversive forms.






